











PROUD AS A PEACOCK

First Grade

Lesson Objectives:

Observation/ Knowledge

- Students will observe photographs of peacocks and their feathers
- Students will find examples of lines and shapes in nature
- Students observe colors of a peacock

Learning

- Students learn facts about peacocks and peafowl
- Students learn about artist, John James Audubon, who painted birds.
- Students learn about types of lines and shapes

<u>Comprehension/</u> <u>Application</u>

- Students will demonstrate their knowledge of line and shape while drawing an original peacock composition
- Students will learn about spatial proportion while drawing

Evaluation

 Self evaluation rubric to assess understanding of concepts presented

Content Steps:

- 1) Students observe photographs of peacocks and peacock feathers. Students find and name lines (straight, angle and curve) and shapes (circle, dot and triangle) found in the photographs.
- 2) Teacher presents information about peacocks to enhance student knowledge and tells the student about a famous artist who painted birds in their natural habitat.
- 3) Students draw their peacock in a "draw with me" lesson with the teacher. Teacher demonstrates using basic line and shape vocabulary, student draws their own.
- 4) Students trace over their pencil drawing with a permanent marker or crayon.
- 5) Students watercolor their compositions using colors they have observed from the peacock photographs (if using crayon, the watercolor can be applied as a "wash"). Allow room for personal interpretation of color.
